Module Description:

This course aims to introduce students to the field of organization theory -- which incorporates concepts from various disciplines such as management studies, sociology, psychology, political sciences and economics to study organizations and their relationships with the environment.

Learning Outcomes:

The objective of this course is to train students to actively and critically use organization theory concepts to make sense, diagnose, manage and respond to the emerging organizational needs and problems.

Students will learn the link between organization theory concepts and the realistic world by reading textbooks and supplementary readings, doing class exercises, and examining case/video discussions.
