FIN4113 PERSONAL FINANCE AND PRIVATE WEALTH MANAGEMENT

Target Audience

The course is primarily intended for individuals who wish to improve their money management skills. It is also suitable for those who aspire to be independent financial advisors or a career in private wealth management.

Course Objectives and Structure

The course is divided into two parts. Part I focuses on the basic building blocks of personal financial management. Topics include (a) key steps in financial planning, (b) tools for financial planning, including time value of money, personal financial statements and cash budgeting, (c) credit management including housing finance, (d) life and health insurance planning and (e) liquid asset management.

Part 2 of the courses focuses on investment. Topics include (a) common mistakes in investment (b) behavioral finance and personal investing (c) strategic asset allocation (d) passive and active investing (e) mutual funds and the hunt for alphas.

Assessment

Students will form project groups. Each group will work on one term paper and one research project, each of which requires the submission of a typewritten report and a class presentation. Students will be graded as follows:

Term papers (25%) Research project (30%) Class participation (20%) Term test (25%)
